A Personal Letter By MariAnne excerpted from the Pigeon Diamond Jubilee book

Dear Friends,

Our Diamond Jubilee book contains many very interesting histories, but being only one generation removed from Europe leaves me with a very abbreviated American ancestorial history; therefore, permit me to digress!

My thoughts are dedicated to a few people who have been influential in my life and to whom I am profoundly grateful. I wish to give them a little place in Pigeon's History.

First, my father, Henry Neurath, whose name means "new council" and probably had political forebears. This "gentle" man was born in 1901 near Marburg, the "University City" of its area. It stands in the shadow of the great "schluss" or castle on the hill, where in 1529, the Reformer, Martin Luther, conferred with another reformer, Zwingli. It is from this historic area that my father came to America, "the land of promise", in 1923. He was 22 years of age when he left that war-ravaged country (soup a-la bark and lard sandwiches). This man, my father, loved people and scorned prejudice. A true patriot, he tried to instill in us a deep appreciation of the precious freedoms of Democracy. "Stand tall", he said, "Look the world in the eye and be content with your lot in life, garnering patience and humility on the way."

He was struck down early in life with illness and his patience and courage were an example I shall carry with me always. "Thanks, Daddy, for being such a great and





loving guy.

At the age of twenty-eight, he married Frieda Rathke (name also denoting council member). Their lot in life together was to be short, but it was a very happy marriage. Their offspring are myself (MariAnne Mai) and Herbert Henry, both residing on Clabuesch Street in Pigeon.

The next person to whom I say "thanks" is Otto Woelke, for to me, he was a teacher above and beyond the call of duty. It is difficult to enumerate the avenues of interest he opened to me. He cared if we absorbed knowledge and often gave a portion of his noon hour to tutor slow students. On rainy days he read stories to us during recess and made them "come alive" stories of Lincoln, and Longfellow's "Legend of Sleepy Hol-

low". He made me "see" the headless horseman. He read the beautiful "Song of Hiawatha" and the shores of Gitche Gumee, our awesome Lake Superior, came alive with truth and legend, the gamut from calm swells to raging seas.

Mr. Woelke constantly whetted our curiosity on annual spring hikes to Baur's woods. This was a time when one could still pick wild flowers. We explored the swamps, the 'wilderness' (as a child, it seemed so) and identified blossoms, trees and birds. It was easy to visualize the heavenly expanse for we used the universe as our model as Mr. Woelke explained the galaxy. He taught us a bit of agriculture and chemistry. This knowledge is of use to me today as I deal with plants, soils, fertilizers, etc.

Most of all, "thanks" for the Biblical-based religious training, which was the highest of all the educational gifts he gave his students. "Thank you, Mr. Woelke."

Another "Thank you" I give to Pastor Emil George Richter, a giant of a man in the manner of religion. He came to Berne, (Pigeon, Michigan) in 1939 and retired in 1950. He was an avid baseball and football enthusiast who spent many a recess with Mr. Woelke involved in games with the school children. Yes, "Thank you, Pastor Richter".





### Recollections of By-Gone Days by George Keim



Once in a while when I write, I have to think to myself, "Did I write about this before or is this the first time I've written about it?"

Well. I've been around a long time and a lot of things have happened in 80 years. I sure can't remember nearly everything that happened in that time. Once a well-meaning boy asked me if I can remember about the Great Fire

of 1881. Well, that's one thing I don't remember, but I did talk with several people who were here when it happened.

I can remember when World War I was going full blast and I remember the teacher told us kids that if we lose the war, the Kaiser would come and get us.

Well, I didn't know who the Kaiser was, but somebody told me the Kaiser was the German King.

Once when I was in Amsterdam, Holland, my daughter took me to a wax museum and there was the Kaiser standing there along with Jack Kennedy, Elvis Presley, the Queen of Holland and Jimmy Carter. I told the Kaiser I wasn't scared of him when I was just a little kid and he just looked at me! I've been to several wax museums and the things look real natural.

I know one thing that scared kids as much as anything and that was if a man told you if you didn't behave, he'd cut your ears off.

Once, I and two other boys were playing around the cattle yards, which were where the Co-op fertilizer plant is now. There was a little calf in one of the pens and one of the boys went in and scared the calf. The owner came and told us to go home or he'd cut our ears off.

Well, we ran as fast as we could and I fell down. We got back of a barn and looked every once in a while, to see if the man was coming. We stayed away from him for awhile.

Back in those days, we respected the older people and when we went to school, if the teacher told us to behave, we behaved. If you didn't, she'd get her strap or rubber hose out and use it. If you went home and told your parents about it chances were that you'd get another licking. Now a lot of teachers are afraid of the kids or their parents, but the kids aren't afraid of anybody.

To those who witnessed the accident it seemed a miracle how any of the occupants of the rig escaped without more serious injury.


#### FIRE PROTECTION.



The "Wurm House" has been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Clare Dast and by December 1 will be the new home of Flowers by MariAnne. Renovation of the house will include pale gold aluminum siding and brown window trim. The flower shop will occupy the main floor, while the upper two stories will remain rental units. A work area will be or organized in the basement. Werner Clabuesch, whose law office is immediately west of the Michigan Avenue home, acquired the building in 1949 and sold it to the Dast's last month. Date of construction is not known, but it pre-dates 1909, when it was purchased by John Wurm and given the nick-name still remembered by many long-time Pigeon residents. ### Christmas at Grandma Morse's...

One of the outstanding Christmases was when I was seven years old. Father drove the horses and the little red sleigh he had made up to the door. The horse blankets had been put over the two seats to help keep us warm. The two soapstones had been heated and wrapped in newspapers, ready to be placed in front and in each seat. We climbed in the sleigh and were off to Grandma's. It was a beautiful day. We had quickly tucked the horse hide robes over our knees. While not as nice as buffalo robe, these kept us warm. As usual, we went the Sand Road between Dunn and Filion Roads. The clumps of evergreens on the sides of the road had some snow on their branches, so it was an interesting ride. When dinner time finally came, all of us were in our places at the table: Mother at the opposite end from Grandpa, the men on the long wooden bench at the back of the table. Grandma next to Grandpa, and we youngsters in the rest of the places. Grandpa, would stand when the baked chicken was brought to the table, and then he would carve it just as they had done in his old home in Wales. After the main course was eaten, Grandma always brought on the dessert; a plum pudding with delicious sauce. The shipbuilders Morses were also owned an estate. Grandpa would tell how much he used to enjoy riding his "Little Brown Mare" on the chase. After dinner, we went down to the front room or parlor. It was a cheery room when fire was put in the Franklin stove with the two little doors which could be opened so one could watch the fire burn. A Christmas tree added to our enjoyment. Grandma's gifts were on the floor in front of the tree. Each person's name was on his gift. All unwrapped. The big attraction was on the center

table on the south side of the room. It held the gifts that Uncle John, who was a teacher, had bought for us. We were surely thrilled! Each niece received a small cup and saucer, each different. (I gave mine away before the sale.) Each nephew was given a jackknife. Our Christmas presents usually consisted of something to wear, most often made of wool. In the spring, Grandma used to wash the wool at the edge of the creek. Then she would card the wool and spin it into yarn on her spinning wheel. She used to dye the yarn different colors; black for stockings and red for our mittens. We were glad to have these homemade gifts, but it was a great thrill to have a gift which had been purchased at a store.

#### Other Good Times...

Uncle Rob had a little house among the trees just over the small hill. Many were the good times playing with cousins Annie, Bert, and Ernest. We built houses and made tunnels in the beautiful white sand on the hill. Since I have written in detail of those times in my writing of the Morse History, I will not use up the space here.

### Visiting the Schluchter Twins...

The twins, Walter and Wallace, were a little older than I. They sometimes came to our home to spend the evening. They were quite small when they came so Father would get out the magic lantern with its little oil lamp and slides with four pictures on each slide. These slides could be pushed through so it was like a moving picture. The twins spoke German when one particular slide passed through. They would laugh and giggle and talk German. While we couldn't understand what they said, we knew they really enjoyed that slide. After the slides we played games. We always kept ours in the organ in the space intended for hymn books. We had Checkers, Old Maid, Peter Coddle's Trip to New York, Authors, and News Boy. The last was a rather small cardboard with numbered circles that told of the news boy's route. You used

a spinner to determine how many spaces you could move ahead each turn. If you landed on a certain number, you might be told to move ahead three spaces or back five. The jail was the bad one. You had to stay in jail two turns and then go back home to start over again! It was a game that held you in suspense until the very end. I used that game to entertain youngsters all through the years. Verneta Bouck bought it at my sale, so likely her grandchildren will play it many times as we played it with the twins. Dick and I often spent our evenings at Schluchter's. We generally played "school". Wallace was always the teacher, and Walter the bad boy. Dick was his helper. When we tired of that, the boys got out the BB gun and we fired it, using the brown door knob on the kitchen door as a target. We were lucky we had few ill effects when we hit the target -which were few and far between as the many small dents on the door testified through the years, until Boucks remodeled the house.



### Editor English Sued for Libel.

Mrs. Hopkins, of Owendale, brought suit against Editor English, of the Huron County Tribune, in Justice Armstrong's court at Owendale one day last week on a charge of libel. It appears that the Tribune contained an article several weeks ago stating that Mrs. Hopkins had used language on a certain occasion, unbecoming a lady. Justice Armstrong rendered a verdict in favor of the complainant. It is reported that Editor English will carry the case to the circuit court.

According to the testimony given, it seems that the Tribune had no occasion to publish the article in question. In Owendale Mrs. Hophins is spoken of very highly and many express their disapproval of the action of the Bad Axe paper.
